This document shows one of the establishment tables, No. 14 for a Rifle Division's Anti-Tank Artillery Battalion. Note that this Top Secret document shows the battalion wielding six 76 mm anti-tank guns with a compliment of 116 men, including two party secretaries and three vehicles, but no horses. Note the approval of the Minister of Defense in the upper left-hand corner.
