Letter, Colonel Marvin J. Coyle to Chang Myon

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Summary:

Colonel Marvin J. Coyle informs Prime Minister Chang Myon about the status of the Rice Collection Program on 24 March 1951, expressing concern because of a possible shortage of imported rice.

Dear Mr Cheng:

According to the figures forwarded this office by the Republic of Korea, the status of the Rice Collection Program as of 24 March 1951 was as follows:

To date we have been unable to obtain further information from the FFA on this subject hence we do not know what rice collections have been made since 24 March 1951.

It is recognized that further collections in the Kyonggi-do and Kangwon-do Provinces are not possible. However, we feel that rigorous and sustained prompt action on the part of the FFA to collect the rice from the remainder of the country will be successful, and must be done now to ensure a sufficient stock of grain feeding the non-producing population particularly.



Please permit me to state that our interest in this matter is based on the probable shortage of imported rice during the next two months. If we or our teams in the provinces can be of assistance, I assure you we will willingly cooperate.
